


[Christmas Card Design Competition](#)


27/04/2026 - Post 18 pathways explained



Young Reporter Scheme

Media Studies students begin *'The Young Reporter Scheme'*

Media Studies students across years 10 to 12 have this term embarked on the exciting *'Young Reporter Scheme'*, in partnership with Newsquest Media Group. Students write for a real newspaper, (The York Press), gaining hands-on experience in the media industry. Throughout the year ahead they will collaborate closely with industry professionals, hone their writing skills, and see their work published. It's an exciting opportunity to build a portfolio, develop their creative voice, and gain first-hand insight into news reporting. Moreover, having work published with Newsquest Media Group, one of the largest newspaper distributors in the UK, makes this experience an impressive addition to any CV or UCAS application!

Before writing their initial articles, the students were led through an online lecture that covered the rules regarding defamation, libel and copyright. They will be treated as 'real life' journalists, and over their time on the scheme are commissioned to write articles, to tight deadlines, and see their work being published online.

This is a fantastic opportunity for our students, and we look forward to seeing them develop their journalistic skills in the months ahead!




Music Tech Trip - Y12 and Y13


A Level Music Technology students spent a day at the University of York's School of Physics, Engineering and Technology, where fourteen Y12 and Y13 learners took part in four hands-on workshops. They explored acoustics in different spaces, discovered how sound is designed for video games, and experimented with coding to generate electronic sounds. The highlight for many was building mini synthesisers, applying their knowledge to real physical kit.

The visit showcased just how broad the subject of Music Technology is, extending far beyond traditional recording and production. Lecturers and PhD students guided the sessions, sharing cutting-edge research and opening students' eyes to the diverse career paths available in the field.











Year 11 Trip to the Madhyamaka Kadampa Meditation Centre

Year 11 GCSE Religious Studies students were an absolute credit to themselves, their parents and the school this week when we visited the Buddhist Meditation Centre near Pocklington.
