

Cycling in the dark

As winter approaches it is often dark when the children set off or return home. With this in mind, we would ask you to ensure your children has working bike lights. In the UK there are legal minimum requirements for cycling after dark; one front white light, one rear red light, plus the reflectors that should already be on the bike.

Other things to note are:

- It is important to check that the lights are working properly, and the reflectors are clean and visible.
- Wearing brightly coloured reflective clothing is a good way to stand out on those darker, rainy or foggy days
- As the seasons change, it may be a good time to consider checking that the route your child takes to school is a well lit path or road.
- Make sure your child's bike is in the best working order it can be will greatly reduce the chances of breaking down while on the road.
- To avoid getting punctures, fit winter tyres to your child's bike and pump them up regularly.
- Regularly check the tyres for nicks, cuts and road debris.
- Avoid cycling in the gutter as this is where most hazards that cause punctures can be found (broken glass and other debris).

Eco-Schools Green Flag Accreditation



I am writing to you to share some exciting news, this year our school has made the decision to work towards Eco-Schools Green Flag accreditation, you can find out more on the Eco-Schools website here: https://www.eco-schools.org.uk/

With the world beginning to experience the effects of climate change; different species of plant and animals becoming extinct every day; and micro-plastics being found in the most remote locations on Earth - now, is the time to educate future generations about the impact of our actions on the planet we call home.

The Eco-Schools programme does this through providing a simple seven-step framework that has been designed to raise awareness of environmental issues whilst empowering young people to make a positive difference by taking a lead on environmental actions and projects in their school and local community.

Within Eco-Schools' simple framework young people have the freedom to decide on the environmental issues they would like to tackle, represented by ten Eco-Schools topics. Once young people have chosen their topics, they decide what actions they would like to take and how they are going to involve their school and community. The seven step process takes around one academic year to complete and culminates in an Eco-Schools' assessor looking over a school's application and evidence, with a view to recognising and celebrating their achievements.

The Eco-Schools programme began in 1994, is delivered in more than 70 countries around the world and in England is operated by the environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy. The programme not only positively impacts our planet (for example schools participating in the programme planted 50,188 trees during the last academic year), it also benefits young people, building teamwork and leadership skills whilst increasing confidence and reducing eco-anxiety.

As a key part of the Eco-Schools process is involving our entire school and wider community, we wanted to get in touch to let you know about our involvement. We also wanted to let you know what to expect over the coming months: regular updates in our school newsletter and other channels; invitations to participate in environmental events and projects; and increasingly conscientious young people.

Key Stage 4 Charity Visit

This year, each key stage in school are raising money for a local charity in the area to help support the local community. In Key stage 4, the students voted to support Snappy, a local charity based in Acomb supporting children with special needs aged 5 all the way up to 25. They do this by providing a place for children to play and be supported with many volunteers on hand. Snappy also take children into the centre to take part in activities they may not always get the chance to do. On Saturday, Mr Paley along with Jack Macaulay, Demi Thomas, Nathaniel Vincent and Ellie Cooper (4 students in Y10 and 11) went to visit Snappy to learn more about them and how we can look to support them throughout this year.

We spent time talking to staff about the charity, how it operates and how they support young children in the area. We then spent time with the children that were there. Our students were interacting with the children, playing games, building towers and conversing with them throughout. The children loved spending time with our students and it is something we will be doing again.

Your child has been sent a link, via Class Charts 'Homework' to complete the **National Physical Activity** and **Well-being Survey.** This survey enables students to have their say and for the School and PE Department to review their curriculum and extra-curricular provision. It would be appreciated if this could be completed at some stage before, or over the Half Term holiday.

Keeping your child safe online

Online Safety is an important part of keeping children safe at Huntington School and we regularly discuss it with students. This helps make them aware of how they can to stay safe and behave appropriately online - but we can only be successful in keeping children safe online if we work with you.

We are aware that there have been some instance of unkind behaviour online recently, particularly on Snap Chat and Tik Tok. With this in mind we wanted to ask you monitor your child's online presence closely. We would also advise that you read any parental guidance and safety recommendations (including age requirements – most popular social networking sites and apps are only for users aged 13+, 16+ or 18+) WhatsApp is not permitted for people under the age of 16. Some young people engage in sexting, it is illegal for them take an image of themselves or another child under 16, as well as possess or share such images.
